

Teacher's Notes: First and Second Class

Background for Teachers

Laudato Si' is a letter sent by Pope Francis to the world. In *Laudato Si'*, which means 'Praise be to you', Pope Francis reminds us that the earth is a gift from God. This gift is for everyone; it is our common home. Pope Francis goes on to describe the terrible things that are happening to the earth. He reminds us that as Christians we are called to share God's love; a love that extends right throughout creation. During Catholic Schools Week 2017 we will celebrate God's gift of the earth; we will learn about St Francis; and we will investigate ways we can love and protect the earth.

Each day's lesson begins with a reflective quote from *Laudato Si'* (*LS*) to put our learning into context with the message of Pope Francis in his encyclical.

Monday: Seeing the beauty of our common home

Reflective Quote: 'When we can see God reflected in all that exists, our hearts are moved to praise the Lord for all his creatures and to worship him in union with them.' (LS 87)

Let's Look

Where possible, the class might begin this lesson outdoors.

Discuss the children's experience of the world around them.

- Encourage them to name what they see/hear/smell/feel.
- What is their favourite sight/sound/colour/smell/texture?
- How do they feel when they think of their favourite part of God's creation?

Prayer

(Based on Psalm 95) God within us ... (Holds hands to the heart) God beyond us ... (Hold hands outwards, at arms level, palms upwards) Creator of the earth ... (Hold hands upwards, at shoulder level, palms upwards) Thank you for your gifts of Creation. (Hands joined in prayer) Amen.

Let's Learn

In the Bible we read about God's gift of the earth. We remember that God's gifts are for everyone. We call this gift our world. It is our home. It is a home for everyone. When we read the beginning of the Bible we remember all the wonderful things that God created.

Share the Creation Story with the children.

God asks us to look after the beautiful world that we call our home. It is a home for the whole world to share. When we care for the world we are sharing God's love. We praise God and thank him for our wonderful world.

Let's Live



Tuesday: Caring for our common home

Reflective Quotes: 'Nature cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live. We are part of nature, included in it and thus in constant interaction with it.' (LS 139)

'I believe that Saint Francis is the example par excellence of care for the vulnerable and of an integral ecology lived out joyfully and authentically.' (LS 10)

'What is more, Saint Francis, faithful to Scripture, invites us to see nature as a magnificent book in which God speaks to us and grants us a glimpse of his infinite beauty and goodness.' (LS 12)

Let's Look

Remind the children of yesterday's activity.

- Who created the world?
- List some of the beauty of God's creation.

Yesterday's lesson focused on a special word: praise.

Differentiation: Introduce another translation: *Laudato Si'*. Explain to the children that this is Latin for 'Praise be to you'. Latin is a very old language that people learned a long time ago.

Today we will be using a new word: care.

- How do we care for our friends/our teeth/our body/our family/our environment?
- What would happen if we didn't care and instead left it up to other people to care for all the important things?

Encourage the children to recall times when they were caring.

• Can they recall an example of Jesus caring for someone?

Share one of the following stories with the children:

- Healing of Man Born Paralysed (Mt 9:1–8; Mk 2:1–12)
- The Lost Sheep (Mt 18:12–14; Lk 15:1–7)
- Zacchaeus (Lk 19:1–10)

Let's Learn

God asks us to care for each other and for our beautiful world. When we care for each other and the environment we know we please God our Father. God is happy because we have done what Jesus asks us to do.







Show the children the image of Pope Francis. Encourage discussion about him. The image may be printed and included on the Prayer Space.

Pope Francis has a special job. He has been chosen by God to teach us how to live the way God wants us to. Pope Francis chose his name because he learned about caring for the environment from another man called Francis. Pope Francis refers to St Francis as his 'guide and inspiration' (*LS 10*).



Look and Respond

Show the children the image of St Francis and the Wolf and ask the following questions.

- What do you see?
- How many people are in the image?
- What kind of creatures are in the picture?
- How many do you see?
- What, do you think, is the man saying to the wolf?







St Francis and the Wolf

A long time ago, when Francis was living in Gubbio, a fierce wolf appeared and began attacking livestock. Soon the wolf began to attack humans, and eat them. The ferocious wolf would wait outside the city gates for anyone who ventured out. No one could capture the wolf and most of those who tried came to a grisly end! Very soon the whole city was terrified of the wolf. Eventually Francis announced that he was going to meet the wolf. Everyone advised him to stay away from the fierce creature; however, Francis decided that the time had come to meet this creature that was causing so much fear. He went to the gate of the city, blessed himself and walked out into the countryside. A crowd followed – at a distance. When Francis came close to the wolf's lair, the crowd stayed back but were close enough to see what happened next.

The wolf spotted Francis and raced towards him with his jaws open wide. Francis blessed himself and in a loud voice told the wolf to stop. The crowd gasped and could hardly believe their eyes when they saw the wolf slow down to a trot, then walk over to Francis and place his head in the hands of the holy man.



Francis spoke to the now tame wolf. He said, 'Brother Wolf, you have done some terrible things. You have filled the entire city with fear. Everyone wants to be rid of you. Please, Brother Wolf, stop attacking the people. Let us make peace.'

The wolf answered, 'I am happy to make peace. I have done terrible things and I am sorry. If the people can leave a little food for me every day, I won't be hungry and will never attack anyone again.'

The wolf held out his paw to Francis and they shared a sign of peace. Then Francis led the wolf back into the city, where the people looked on in shock. In the marketplace, Francis gave a sermon to all the people. He asked them to share peace with all God's creation. The wolf lay at Francis' feet all the time he spoke. From that day on, the townspeople always remembered to leave out food for the wolf and when he died he was buried in a special place.



St Francis called all creatures, big and small, by the name of 'brother' or 'sister'. This helps us to understand that we should care for all God's creation the way we care for our brothers and sisters.

Let's Live Consider

- How do we care for God's creation?
- How do we care for God's creatures?

Encourage the children with pets to share how they care for their pets.

St Francis called all creation his brothers and sisters.

- How should we treat our brothers and sisters?
- How can we treat God's creation like our brothers and sisters?

Prayer

A Hymn of Praise (Ps 100:3–5) (Children repeat after teacher) O Lord, my God, We praise you for the beautiful world that you have created. We praise you for creating all the people. We praise you for all the life you have created. We give thanks with joy. Praise the Lord, Praise the Lord.

Thursday: Protecting our common home

Reflective Quotes: 'I urgently appeal for a new dialogue about how we are sharing the future of our planet. We need a conversation which includes everyone, since the environmental challenge we are undergoing, and its human roots, concern and affect us all.' (LS 14)

'The earth, our home, is beginning to look more and more like an immense pile of filth.' (LS 21)

The problems of pollution and waste are 'closely linked to a throwaway culture ...' (LS 22)

'Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such right.' (LS 33)

Let's Look

Revise what we mean when we refer to the gift of creation. Revise who reminds us to care for creation. (Pope Francis and St Francis) Today we are going to investigate what Pope Francis refers to as our common home.

Prayer

Praise to you God, for the wonderful gifts you share with us. We give thanks for all you give us. Help us to mind and care for your creation. Amen.

Let's Learn

In his letter Pope Francis speaks about the earth hurting.

- Did you ever get hurt? What happened?
- Did someone care for you? What did that person do?
- How can the earth hurt?
- What might make the earth sad?
- Have you seen anything in God's creation that might make you sad?

Let's Live



'... we realise that the world is a gift which we have freely received and must share with others.' (LS 159)


'A great cultural, spiritual and educational challenge stands before us, and it will demand that we set out on the long path of renewal.' (LS 202)

- How do we save energy?
- How do we conserve water?
- How do we keep healthy and cut down on air pollution?
- How do we care for plants and animals in our locality?
