What is the World Meeting of Families?

Pope John Paul II established the first World Meeting of Families in 1994. This took place in Rome and was a celebration of the importance of marriage and family life in our society and in the life of the Church. It takes place every three years as an international celebration of the joy of marriage and family life.



Activity

What is going to happen in Ireland for the World Meeting of Families?

21 August 2017 Launch of a one-year programme in Knock in preparation for the congress

21 August 2018 National opening of the World Meeting of Families 2018 in Dublin

22-25 August 2018 Three-day congress in Dublin, including prayer, celebration and catechesis

26 August 2018 Festival of Families

27 August 2018 Solemn Eucharistic Celebration (hopefully Pope Francis will be in attendance)

In his homily at the last World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia, Pope Francis said:

'Whoever gives you a cup of water in my name will not go unrewarded,' says Jesus (cf. Mk 9:41). These little gestures are those we learn at home, in the family; they get lost amid all the other things we do, yet they do make each day different. They are the quiet things done by mothers and grandmothers, by fathers and grandfathers, by children, by brothers and sisters. They are little signs of tenderness, affection and compassion. Like the warm supper we look forward to at night, the early lunch awaiting someone who gets up early to go to work. Homely gestures. Like a blessing before we go to bed, or a hug after we return from a hard day's work. Love is shown by little things, by attention to small daily signs which make us feel at home. Pope Francis' Five Finger Prayer

In keeping with Pope Francis' simple lifestyle and simple fashion choices, he has offered us a very simple way to pray. He has given us the Five Finger Prayer.

Pope Francis' Five Finger Prayer

- 2. Next is your index finger. Pray for those who teach you, instruct you and heal you. They need support and wisdom to show direction to others. Always keep them to your prayers.
- 3. The following finger is the tallest. It reminds us of our leaders, the governors and those who have authority. They need God's guidance.
- 4. The fourth finger is the ring finger. It may surprise you that this is our weakest finger. It should remind us to pray for the weakest. The sick or those plagued by problems.

1. The thumb is closest to you, so start praying for those who are closest to you. They are the persons easiest to remember. To pray for our dear ones is a 'sweet obligation'.



5. And finally we have our smallest finger. Your pinkie should remind you to pray for yourself. Once you have prayed for the other groups, you will have a perspective on your own needs. You will be able to pray for your own needs in a better way.
