Reflective Exercise

Amoris Laetitia

Amoris Laetitia, and also *Laudato Si'*, talk about Christians being 'sons and daughters' and 'brothers and sisters'. The family is the place where 'we learn to live as one' (194). In fact, *Amoris Laetitia* goes on to say that 'growing up with brothers and sisters makes for a beautiful experience of caring for and helping one another' (195). The role of the family is to teach us how to be brothers and sisters. 'Children do need to be patiently taught to treat one another as brothers and sisters' (195).

- Outline the challenges associated with having and being brothers and sisters.
- Write a short passage on how we would treat others if we saw them as our 'brothers and sisters'.

Discussion

What do you understand as our 'wider family'?

Amoris Laetitia

Amoris Laetitia states that 'the nuclear family needs to interact with the wider family made up of parents, aunts and uncles, cousins and even neighbours' (187). This view of family allows us to identify people who might 'need assistance', 'companionship' or 'consolation' (187). If our view of family is too limited, it causes isolation and 'such isolation, cannot offer greater peace or happiness; rather it straitens the heart of a family and makes its life all the more narrow' (187).

Discussion

Activity

Read 1 Corinthians 12:31–13:13 from the Bible. This letter from Paul is known as the 'Hymn to Love'. In a very explicit way, it tells us that no matter what we possess, even faith and hope, the greatest thing that we can possess is love.

Read the following extract from the 'Hymn to Love'.

Love is patient, love is kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way, it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Amoris Laetitia discusses this passage in chapter four, 'Love in Marriage'. In the context of *Amoris Laetitia*, this passage is used to show couples what love ought to be, but this description of love is a message for each and every one of us.

In order to fully understand what this biblical passage is saying, complete the following activity.

From your experience of love in your family:

Give an example of a time when you showed patience.

Give an example of a time when you showed kindness.

Give an example of how love could be jealous or boastful.

Give an example of how love could be arrogant or rude.

Identify the word that highlights how real love does not insist on its own way:

Give an example of how love could be irritable or resentful.

Give an example of how love might rejoice in right.

Explain how love 'endures all things'.

These stories remind us of the kind of person Jesus was. *Amoris Laetitia* states that 'God's indulgent love always accompanies our human journey; through grace, it heals and transforms hardened hearts, leading them back to the beginning through the way of the cross' (62).

• In your groups, discuss how using Jesus as our role model could help us in our family life.
