Introduction:



Most, if not all, people experience a sense of awe and wonder at some time in their lives – it could be a beautiful nature scene, an amazing piece of music, an unexpected gift or gesture of kindness. These moments can be experiences of the wonder of God and creation, providing insights into the heart of what surrounds us, experiences we might miss if we're too busy or distracted by our busy lives or by technology. The more of these experiences we have, the fuller our lives can be – even more so if we add an element of reflection.

In *Laudato Si'* Pope Francis quotes the Canadian bishops, who said: 'From panoramic vistas to the tiniest living form, nature is a constant source of wonder and awe' (*Laudato Si'*, 85).



Accompanying Notes

The theme of Wonder and Awe can be pursued in conjunction with other subjects as follows:



English/Irish: Students could explore nature poetry, including on any prescribed poetry lists, and compose their own expressions of awe and wonder.

Music: Students could listen to pieces of music that explore the wonders of creation or pieces of music renowned for inspiring people.

Geography: Students could explore the physical wonders of the world – natural or made by humans. Science: Students could explore the marvellous complexity of creation – from the smallest particles to the vastness of the universe.
